II. Besides the consideration of itemwise specifications as given above, the following points of a more general nature are to be kept in view.

1. The teaching and testing of spoken English with the help of the prescribed textbook should be confined to the British "Received pronunciation only."
2. The question paper for this component on spoken English should carry a compulsory question on broad phonetic transcription carrying 5 marks.  
(The items for the question should be confined to words selected from the prescribed textbook as per the list given).

3. The Viva for the component should comprise

- (i) Reading aloud, with proper stress, clarity and naturalness, passages and dialogues given in the prescribed textbook on pp. 160-180.
- (ii) Intonation as specified at item 6(2) above.
- (iii) General conversational ability.
- (iv) The pattern of testing in the written examination or the viva to be adopted at the internal evaluation should be the same as that at the University examination.
